Summer Assignment

Summer Reading: Students are responsible for reading *James and the Giant Peach* by Roald Dahl and at least one of the books below:

- Alice's Adventures in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll
- The Tales of Despereaux by Kate DiCammillo
- Shiloh by Phyllis Reynolds Naylor

Summer Writing Assignment: The characters in your summer reading books are boys and girls who gain memories that will live with them forever. How might the characters' memories help them grow? As you are enjoying your summer vacation, keep track of the memories you are developing. Pick the most important memory and construct a written explanation. Students should write a complete paragraph (5-8 sentences) that explains their most memorable happening from the summer of 2015. Here are some questions you may want to ask yourself: What is your memory? Why is this memory important to you? Does this memory help you in any way? Is this a good or bad memory?

As writers, we must make sure that we always have evidence to support our words. While students will learn to use textual evidence throughout the school year, this assignment will be supported with a visual. Find an artifact that relates to your summer memory. Artifacts can be any item associated with your moment (a photograph, ticket stub, flower, song, rock, etc...). Your artifact will support the paragraph you write by proving you actually lived this moment. The item that accompanies your paragraph will also assist you in recalling the event and explaining your memory. Whether you share about a place you may have traveled to, camp or rainy day, no memory is too big or small. You are the author and the only person who knows the importance of this memory.

Math

Practicing and improving your multiplication will be very important as you enter fourth grade. While a brief review may be provided at the beginning of the year, students are expected to know their multiplication facts. Mastering your multiplication will assist in eliminating unnecessary stress as we move forward to more challenging mathematics. I will always offer assistance to any student who may be struggling to grasp a new concept; however, students should create their own multiplication flashcards. Make this a fun summer assignment by constructing flashcards that you design.

I would recommend buying index cards so that you can have a pocket sized multiplication assistant (decorate them however you would like). I also recommend creating and practicing one new set of multiplication facts per week. Below is a schedule to help outline your summer Math assignment. Students will also be asked to complete a multiplication log to create a fun challenge where you push yourself to see how fast you can identify multiplication facts. All summer work will be collected the first week of school.

Week 2-8s times table

Week 3-7s times table

Week 4-6s times table

Week 5-5s times table

Week 6-4s times table

Week 7-3s times table

Week 8-2s and 1s times table

My outline is only a suggestion. Feel free to complete your flashcards more quickly, but make sure you devote time (10-15 minutes per day) to become a master of multiplication. Your flashcards will allow you to practice in any environment: long car ride, on the beach, etc...The Math Multiplication Log can be printed out so that you can share your progress with me (one log per week). If you do not have access to a printer, feel free to document your practice on notebook paper.
